

PRAY ... FOR THE CLIMATE CRISIS...YOUR CHURCH ...YOURSELF... OTHERS

In consultation with the PCC (Church Council) I have fixed monthly evenings of prayer for the remainder of the year, and three focus weeks of prayer (In Lent, before Pentecost, and in Advent).

I, and many others I am sure, pray all through every week for Westcott and beyond, praying for the people of the village and others in particular need, so why this further focus ? I guess, in essence, because you cannot have too much of a good thing.

Prayer "allows" God to work; prayer is the dynamite that breaks up the strongholds of sin, death and the devil. In prayer, we meet with God and circumstances change and/or we are changed – we become wiser, stronger, more centred in Truth and Goodness. I sense we need much more of the power of prayer:

- For the Climate Crisis and other international threats to our existence. Climate science tells us that without a concerted turnaround by individuals, corporations and world governments, we are heading for catastrophe by 2030. Also, the current Coronavirus reminds us how

we all are vulnerable to international threat. We have seen prayer change the course of international events before. For example, early in the Second World War, millions of people in this country flocked into churches in response to King George VI's call for a day of prayer, and by 1942 as the tide of the War was turning, Winston Churchill wrote: "I sometimes have a feeling of interference. I want to stress that. I have a feeling sometimes that some Guiding Hand has interfered. I have a feeling that we have a Guardian...." We can pray the "Guiding Hand" is evident in all the national and international challenges we face.

- For our/the Church. Thank God, as Bishop Jo Bailey-Wells said after a visit last year, that Holy Trinity is "so very healthy". However, we know the challenges the Church is facing throughout the whole country against the tide of secularism and indifference. There have been many examples in Church history where revivals in attendance, mission and ministry have been preceded by regular, focussed prayer. We can pray for revival.

Brighton Royal Pavilion

Despite the unpromising weather, we enjoyed a pleasant coach journey to the Royal Pavilion at Brighton, where our party was divided into two groups for a guided tour. Our group's guide gathered us into the Red Drawing Room for an informative and entertaining introduction to the history of the Pavilion, and the lavish creation of the Prince Regent, later King George IV.



We learned that his modest Marine Pavilion, designed by Henry Holland in 1787, was to evolve into the grand oriental design of John Nash, completed in the early 1820s. Here the Indian style of the exterior combined with an interior reflecting the

fashionable interest in exotic Chinese decoration. After the death of George IV, the Pavilion was used as a seaside palace by King William IV, and then Queen Victoria, by whom it was sold



1850 in to the Town of Brighton. Prior this sale to interior the stripped was of virtually all fixtures and fittinas. although many original items were subsequently returned. Currently items



usually housed in Buckingham Palace have been loaned back to the Pavilion by Her Majesty The Queen, whilst a major programme of maintenance work is carried out at the Palace.

Our guide then conducted us on a fascinating tour of the State Rooms on the ground floor, including the Entrance Hall, the Long Gallery, the Music Room, the Banqueting Room and their galleries. We marvelled at the furniture, works of art and magnificent Regency silver-gilt, and were amused to learn that the gilt dragons were more Welsh than Chinese - they were designed by Robert Jones who had never been to China!

We were intrigued to learn of the concealed corridor where the servants would scurry about their work unseen by the guests, and to see the spacious and airy Great Kitchen with the cutting-

edge technology of the day, including a device for mechanically turning the spit. conceived by George IV, richly decorated in crimson, gold and silver and dazzlingly reflected in huge mirrors.

Perhaps the climax of the tour was the Saloon, which was re-opened in September 2018 after a six-year restoration. For the first time in over 170 years we see the room as originally Expressing our thanks to our excellent guide, we left the Pavilion for the Lanes, to meet up with the other group for lunch. Then there was time for a quick return to the Pavilion,



to browse in the gift shop or visit the first floor rooms, before re-joining our coach for the journey home. Once again our leaders had arranged a wonderful day out.



Future Mole Valley – Draft Local Plan released for consultation



MVDC has now formally released for consultation the draft Local Plan which covers the next 15 years and which identifies

potential locations and other development sites in the District. The public consultation will run between 3rd February and 23rd March 2020 – one week later than first announced.

The two proposed sites for Westcott are included in the draft Local Plan which can be found on the WVA website www.westcottvillage.com or at www.futuremolevalley.org The council will be holding presentation meetings across the District and the WVA encourages as many people as possible to attend one of these events listed at https://futuremolevalley.org/consultation/

You may also want to take the time to listen to Guy Davies' presentation

Jane Smith, the interim Planning Policy Manager (who has replaced Guy Davies) will be attending the **Open Meeting due to be held on 5th March at 19.30** hours at Holy Trinity Church, Westcott. She will give a brief introduction and answer questions, but primarily she will want to listen to residents' views on the proposed draft plan.

Speeding and Noise Campaign

the WVA is campaigning on your behalf over. We are hopeful that this will result in further discussions with stakeholders, including the WVA, to agree what practical measures will be implemented.

Responsible Vehicle Use and Ownership in Westcott

Did you know that the mean traffic speeds in Westcott have been recorded as 36 mph near School Lane and 30 mph at the Green? Nearly on one seven vehicles were going at 41mph and 34mph or more respectively.

In January I asked the Surrey County Council Local Committee to look at what measures could be put in place to reduce the speed of traffic in our village to improve safety. Their background information showed that there were a total of 15 collisions on our village centre one mile stretch of road from December 2014 to November 2019. This included one collision resulting in serious injury and 14 collisions resulting in slight injury. Two slight injury collisions involved pedestrians. Four slight injury collisions involved motorcyclists.

- Six collisions involved shunts
- Seven collisions involved loss of control of the vehicle
- One involved "failure to look properly"

- One involved overtaking
- One involved exceeding the speed limit



The 30 mph section of road within Westcott is included on the Mole Valley speed management plan as a site requiring enforcement by the

police. As a result of highlighting the issue, County council officers have now met with police colleagues to discuss the speed management plan and an update and consideration of potential options for speed management and enforcement has been requested. Their conclusions will be discussed with the Village Association before any changes are implemented.

In addition to the speed concerns, frequently residents see drivers ignoring the pedestrian crossing at the Green. Our local police team did some observations of this recently and spoke to a number of drivers as a result. Drivers passing through the crossing when pedestrians are waiting to cross is against highway code advice but is not an offence. Driving over the crossing while pedestrians were still on it is an offence and when observed will be dealt with appropriately.

Slow Cooked Pomegranate Ox Cheeks

2 ox cheeks, cut in half

100g plain flour

Freshly ground salt and pepper

1 onion

1 carrot

1 stick of celery

2 bay leaves

1 knob of butter

1 large glass of red wine

1.5 cups pomegranate juice

1 tbsp pomegranate molasses

Large glug of extra virgin olive oil

Method (Serves 2)

- Pat the ox cheeks dry with kitchen paper, then season with freshly ground salt and black pepper.
- Toss the cheeks in plain flour, then lightly sear in a pan with a glug of oil, on both sides until nicely browned, then remove from the pan.
- 3. Finely dice the onion, carrot and celery and sauté in a knob of butter on a medium heat for 6-7 minutes.
- 4. Place the onion, carrot and celery mixture and with the bay leaves into a slow cooker on a medium heat setting, followed by the ox cheeks, pomegranate juice, molasses and red wine.
- 5. Cook for six hours. (If cooking in an oven, cook at 150 degrees C for 4-5 hours)
- When ready, remove the ox cheeks from the slow cooker/oven, and loosely cover with foil to keep warm.
- Discard the bay leaves and transfer the liquid into a saucepan, bring to the boil and allow to reduce until it is syrupy. Stir regularly.
- Serve the ox cheeks with butternut squash mash and the reduced sauce drizzled on top, finished with some fresh pomegranate seeds.

this article will have been one of the drivers spoken to during this police work – previous research has demonstrated that speeding vehicles coming through the village are often being driven by local residents. So, the first thing we can all do is to stick to the rules and take responsibility ourselves.

Elsewhere, there have been complaints that the Byway Open To All Traffic ("BOAT") that is Wolvens Lane, to the west of Westcott, is being used late at night by quad and motorbikes – revving noisily which can be heard across the village (prevailing wind direction and the lack of other noise sources serving to augment the impact). Again, this isn't necessarily illegal, it is just something that has an impact on other people.

Finally, the same seems to go for taking responsibility when parking in our village. Residents often tell me that it isn't visitors to our village that park over their entrances or otherwise blocking access, but fellow residents that they know.

Through the Westcott Neighbourhood Development Plan, it was demonstrated that there is a shortage of parking spaces for residents in the village. People are genuinely understanding of the challenge, but are asking me to spread the word about the issue and appeal for a little more responsibility.





Tales from the Caves

On 14th Jan at the new venue in St John's Hall some 29 members braved the rainy evening to gather to hear Peter Burgess give a talk about "Tales from the Caves". To supplement his own experiences visiting the caves with the Wealden Cave & Mine Society he had collected a number of stories of mostly nefarious events from newspaper historical archives dating back into the 1800s. These mainly concerned caves and tunnels in Reigate, Godstone and Merstham.

He started with several accounts of thefts of equipment from the Reigate Red Cross sand caves between 1858 and 1870. The sand was commercially excavated for making glass and their equipment was habitually stolen. In those days the lighting underground was provided by candles which must

have made activity in the half dark particularly difficult. In more recent times (1942) in the Reigate Castle grounds there was a shooting range in one of the tunnels and there was an incident involving theft of a rifle, a revolver and some ammunition rounds for which young boys were responsible.

Moving on to Godstone in 1935, where caves were utilised for mushroom growing, there was an incident in 1935 involving the theft of corrugated iron sheets used for covering the wooden trays in which mushrooms were grown.

Some photos showed the very primitive conditions in which this little industry was performed. Men had to manhandle the large wooden trays filled with compost manure on which sandy soil from Chichester was spread and the mushrooms grew. This was still a thriving industry in 1948 carried on in the half dark of the caves.

Peter Burgess mentioned a particular account from Godstone where in 1942 some 83 bottles of brandy and some wine were stolen from WW2 stores owned by a military supply company. All these reports usually concerned a court case but we never learned the outcome!



It seems that in Merstham in 1810 after a period of serious flooding there was a big subsidence in an area of limestone/chalk caves. This resulted in a court case between the Lord of the Manor and the local Miller who owned the land but had not dug the caves himself – they were licenced as mines by the Lord of the Manor.

The consequence of the subsidence was that the water course to the water mill had shifted and the mill lost its means of power. The Miller took the Lord of the Manor to court but it is not clear what the outcome was for the unfortunate Miller!

Peter Burgess had some interesting photos of the extraction of limestone blocks used for prestigious buildings in the local area and in South London. It is thought that all these caves and tunnels had first been excavated as early as 1300 -1400 to obtain building stone.



Imogen Barker. our Chairman. thanked Peter for his talk and the effort he must have put researching the history of our nearby caves. Our next Talk is scheduled for Tuesday 10th March at the usual time in St John's Hall at 8pm and is expected to be a slideshow of scenes and personalities in Westcott over the years.

Under the headline, "The key to a longer life? Museums!", a recent newspaper article gave the news, "Trips to art galleries, museums or the theatre can help you live longer, research has suggested". Dorking Museum is playing its part!

Gallery Talk, Thursday 19th March: 'Mrs. Pankhurst's Purple Feather'.



The Museum is delighted to welcome author Tessa Boase to the Museum to present a talk on her book, 'Mrs. Pankhurst's Purple Feather: Fashion, Fury and Feminism – Women's Fight for Change'.

When Mrs. Pankhurst stormed the House of Commons with her crack squad of militant suffragettes in 1908, she wore on her hat a voluptuous purple feather. This is the intriguing story behind that feather, the rise and fall of 'murderous millinery' and the birth of the all-female RSPB. Tessa will be signing copies of her book after the talk. At the Museum, 7pm, doors open 6.30pm. Tickets £7 (£5.00 members),

includes a glass of Prosecco. Entry on the door or book in advance on the Museum website.

Our current Spring exhibition is 'How do we look at Dorking? The Town and its Landscapes over 150 years'. The Museum's curator of paintings, Sandra Wedgwood, has gathered together paintings and drawings of the area, from conventional views to interesting interpretations of the local townscape and landscape.



She asks, how have we seen our surroundings over the last 150 years? Is there a clear pattern? Do we see them as Realistic, or mostly realistic with some artistic licence? Do we want them to be Romantic or simply Beautiful? Can modern Technology help us see them anew or does it cause us to interpret them from our imagination?

Evidence comes from works by prominent local artists like Charles Collins and those who visited and

captured local views like Arthur C Fare as well as more contemporary interpretations such as that by Harvey and Ackroyd and even views from a drone. As Sandra says, "I want people to look closely at the images on the wall rather than to read words about them. I hope that they will find them fascinating."

Archaeological finds:



Dorking Museum recently has accepted a number of significant local archaeological finds datina from the medieval and early modern periods. The largest is a 16th

or early 17th century pear-shaped jug, usually known as a 'bellarmine', found in the middle of the last century during building work behind the former Red Lion Hotel (previously the Cardinal's Hat) in the High Street.

Two of the other items, both found in Betchworth, are a jetton (an accounting token) made in Germany in the 16th century and a bent fragment of a medieval silver annular brooch, complete with its pin, estimated to date from c1200-1400. It

is hoped to be able to display these items soon, although, at the time of writing, the Museum is seeking a volunteer curator to care for its artefact collections.

Walking in Dorking:

With Spring well on the way, the Museum walks team has been polishing its boots ready for this year's programme of guided walks. See Dorking in a new light with a Museum guide! Scheduled walks in March include:

Mayflower 400 Walk, 1st March, 2pm from the Museum. See buildings that were in existence during the time of the Pilgrim Fathers and which survive today: 16th/17th century cottages, the site of the market hall and the communal washing place, the site of compulsory Sunday morning archery practice and the inns that our local travellers would have known.

Hidden Dorking Historic Walk, 4th March, 2pm from the Museum. Journey into Dorking's history with a guided walk of the town to see hidden Dorking: the secrets that lie behind the modern streets and the people who built the town's reputation.

2pm from entrance to Betchworth Park golf club. Stunning views across to Box Hill and towards Brockham with

Assurance and can be found on Amazon, but be sure to search under his name, not the book title!









TALES FROM A TRAVELLER



Goat Leprosy

Chogoria Mission Hospital in the shadow of Mount Kenya, had the responsibility of tending to leprosy patients in Northern Kenya. One bright sunny African morning

we set out in a loaded Land Rover heading north. The Northern Frontier District (NFD) of Kenya is a vast arid area populated by nomads. Their main form of transport is camels and they are accompanied by large herds of goats and rather scrawny cattle. There is no stigma associated with leprosy but the lepers keep to themselves and seem to look forward to our visits.



The first few interactions went well. Although there is no cure for the disease, we would monitor their progress and adjust their medication accordingly. The next group always gave us problems but there they were patiently waiting for us. We'd chosen a large tree, the only one for miles around and told them to count 12 full moons before meeting us there again. Unfortunately their disease was worsening. Amongst all of them. Still we handed out a year's worth of medication to each of them and invited them to the traditional feast we provided. This they really enjoyed and the festivities went on 'til the early hours.

Something was not right. They had been given thousands of pounds worth of medicine, generously supplied by the German Leprosy Mission and yet they were getting worse. Thus we decided to take a leaf out of the Greek's book at the siege of Troy. Taking our man Thomas to one side, we told him to wander off and get "lost". We would leave and come back for him in a week or so. And so it happened: back we came to find a tearful Thomas sitting under the tree reading his bible. He was alone.

"The Goats won't get leprosy" he said. "But Thomas" I said, "Goats can't get leprosy. What do you mean?" "As soon as you left, they gave all the medicine to the goats!" "Why would the do that?" I asked, aghast. "They know that these medicines will never cure them, only stop them getting worse. This is not good enough for them: cure or nothing. The only reason they counted 12 moons and came to the tree was for the feast."

The Climate & Ecological Crisis

What we eat affects our health and the health of the planet.

Our food system is responsible for the loss of almost 60% of global biodiversity. Loss of habitats to grow mono crops and increased use of pesticides and fertilizers are contributing to species extinction.



A huge reported decline in the number of insects threatens food supply - they pollinate 35% of plant crops.

We need food to sustain us in our daily lives, however, in our busyness it is easy to spare little thought to where our food has come from and how it was grown, harvested or produced. Fast food, ready meals and processed foods are very convenient and often cost effective but can take their toll on our health, the environment and lead to a growing lack of knowledge of how to grow and cook food.

The globalized food system gives us access, via industrialized agriculture and supermarkets, to plentiful, cheap food, but at a significant cost to the environment: greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuel usage in transportation and packaging; air and water pollution from pesticides and fertilizers; and soil degradation.



The resulting depletion of these natural resources means that our current food system is unsustainable - sooner or later it will collapse.

In their 2019 report 'Our Planet, Our Health' the Environmental Audit Committee found that the UK's 'high dependency on imported fresh food, coupled with a failure to act on climate breakdown, is risking national food security.' It also expressed concern that the poorest and most vulnerable would be worst affected by any food price rises, which may be triggered by crop failures.

What can I do?

Choose palm oil free products.

Palm oil production destroys rainforests and biodiversity, as vast areas of land are cleared for planting. Orangutans are now at serious risk of extinction as 80% of their habitat has been destroyed in 20 years. Palm oil is found in around half of supermarket products, due to its useful properties and cheap cost. www.ethicalconsumer.org/palm-oil-free-list



Eat locally-produced, seasonal food Locally-produced food is generally fresher, tastier and more nutritious. It reduces the need for transportation, meaning less carbon emissions and helps to support the local economy. Food bought and eaten during its natural season of growth is likely to be produced with fewer human inputs. It may also be cheaper, due to seasonal abundance. Grow some of your own food at home or in the local community.



Eat less meat and dairy

Livestock is responsible for around 18% of the greenhouse gases that contribute to global warming – more than the emissions from all cars and planes.

It takes up to 12kg of animal feed and 15,500 litres of water to produce 1kg of intensively reared beef.

Eating more fruit and vegetables but less meat is likely to be both healthier for you and more sustainable for the planet.

Abinger Roughs have been owned and managed by the National Trust since July 1950 when the freehold was acquired from the Abinger Hall Estate. This unique parcel of land has an often overlooked history dating back to the Neolithic with continuous occupation through to the modern day. The Roughs and surrounding fields contain burial mounds, pit dwellings, Roman villas and vineyards as well as Georgian and Victorian pathways, tree planting and shrubs.

The glade which is next to Frogbury Lane was the site of the first Abinger Fair as well as being the original home for the village cricket team until they moved down into the field in front of Abinger Hall. (Their current home was a marsh until it was donated as the village war memorial in 1920). Perhaps the best known historical feature on Abinger Roughs is the memorial stone marking where Bishop Samual Wilberforce fell from his horse and died. His body then being carried to Abinger Hall and laid out on the billiard table.

It seams only fitting that in our 125th anniversary year, The National Trust in the Surrey Hills should choose Abinger Roughs as the site for our next fantastic habitat creation project.

Land, Outdoors and Nature

As part of a major strategy beginning in 2015, the National Trust has committed to restoring or creating 25,000 hectares of priority habitat by 2025. This will be a major contribution towards combatting species loss and climate change across the UK. Priority habitats might include chalk grassland, wildflower meadows, wetland creation, river restoration or woodpasture/parkland creation. In the case of Abinger Roughs we are very excited to be working towards extablishing 34.5ha (85 acres) of wood pasture.

What is Wood Pasture?

Woodpasture is an ancient habitat, originally created by native animals which humans have long ago driven to extinction, and recreated by farmed animals. Many of the best current woodpastures in Britain are former medieval deer parks, royal hunting forests and old wooded commons. These areas contain large, old, open grown native trees and a mosaic of haitats including scrub and an open ground layer. These ancient trees have their own unique assemblage of fungi and invertebrates as well as bats. mammals and birds. They are vital links to our ecological past, and without appropriate management they will be lost.

What's involved?

There are a few stages to this project:
• Refence the entire perimeter of

Abinger Roughs and install a central division.

- Thin the woodland to allow more light in and promote ground flora.
- Reduce the amount of invasive, non-native Rhododendron ponticum.
- "Halo release" veteran trees to promote long side growth.
- The selective creation of new pollards by the cutting back of branches above grazing height
- Introduce low level cattle grazing to the site.

This process will produce a large amount of timber. The smaller trunks will be sold for biomass, or used as wood fuel throught National trust offices in the Surrey Hills. The larger trunks will be milled and seasoned at Landbarn Farm where our carpentry team will use them to create a huge range of items and suport the work of the Surrey Hills team.
